#### THE INTERNET (Contributed by Carlos Cordeiro)

The "Internet" is a buzz word these days and every one, almost without exception, is somehow interested in the Internet. To provide members with some very basic information about the Internet we hope to provide some details over the next few months.

##### What is the Internet ?

The internet is the single largest telecommunications system ever conceived by mankind. It is a world wide computer network through which one can send a letter (e-mail), chat to people electronically (chat areas); search for information on almost any subject (www and newsgroups); transfer files electronically (FTP); and remotely access one's own computer from a totally different location (Telnet). Quite simply stated, the internet is a "network of computer networks".

##### When/how did the Internet first start ?

Sometime in the 1960s during the Cold War, it became apparent that there was an urgent need for a bombproof system of communications. As a result a concept was devised whereby computers were linked

together throughout the country. The thought behind this concept was that in case part of the country was destroyed, messages could still get through to other parts of the country.

Initially only the US Government and a relatively few universities were linked up. The Internet was viewed as an emergency military communications system operated by the Department of Defence's Advanced Research Project Agency (ARPA). The whole operation was referred to as ARPANET. In time computers were installed at every university in the United States that had defence related funding. The Internet had gradually grown from a military pipeline to a communications tool for scientists and at which time the administration of the system was transferred from ARPA to the national Science Foundation. Years later, businesses began using the Internet and the administration of the System was transferred once again. Currently no one part "operates" the Internet. No individual, no corporation and no government owns the Internet - it is owned, operated and maintained by all those of us who use it (yes - including ourselves).

#### What is the www ?

The World Wide Web (www) is the internet facility that allows one to browse linked web pages around the world.

#### What is a URL ?

A URL (Uniform resource locator) is the method by which documents on the WWW are referenced. In layman terms a URL is a website address. A URL, one might say, is made up of the following components:-

**http://**- This is the hypertext transmission protocol that computers on the internet use to communicate with one another.

**www**:- This is found usually in front of the domain, indicating web pages

**casademacau.net/MCA**:- This is our domain name. No one else in cyberspace can have this name. It is registered and a small fee is paid each year in order to keep it.

**net**:- Means a non-profit organisation

**ca**:- Means Canada

**uk**:- Means United Kingdom

**com**:- Commercial organisation

**edu**:- Educational institution

**gov**:- Non-military government organisations

**mil**:- Military government organisations

One might also see a URL that may look like this: 193.63.249.181. This would be an Internet Protocol (IP) number. The IP number is actually used to route data between two machines. The host name is perhaps more informative to the user.

#### When you click on a URL

When you are surfing the Internet and you move from a web page created in say Japan to one created in Holland, what happens ? When you click on a link (which is a word or image attached to a URL). Your computer sends out a request for information from another server. That server may be just across town, or on the other side of the world. The server interprets your request, then breaks up the information (text, graphics, or entire Web pages), into packets. The server then sends the packets containing the information you are seeking into your computer, where your browser re-assembles them and you see that exciting page of recipes, all in a blink of an eye depending on the speed of one's modem speed and the speed of the other servers). If you like to compare links and servers to phone numbers (links) and phone companies (servers) you will have a pretty comparable idea of what this is all about and how it all works.

#### How do I get started ?

Before any one begins the exciting adventure of using the www there are a few things that must be in place:-

· Choose an ISP (Internet service provider): This is the company that will provide you with an access to the Internet. Your ISP will handle the link from your PC to the rest of the Internet. The ISP's central computer is linked to the rest of the Internet so the person using this service only pays the telephone charges to connect their home computer to the ISP's central computer. An Internet Service Provider may be included in the purchase of a personal computer.

· Purchase a modem:- Currently the fastest traditional modem is 56K. This means that 56,000 bits of information can be transferred from the Internet to your computer per second. Many computer packages sold today come with a modem as part of the system. Some of these computer packages include a digit service line (DSL) modem that is faster than the traditional 56K modem. Another option would be to subscribe to a cable-modem service such as Rogers@Home.

· Select a browser:- A browser is an application that allows you to view the Web pages. Although many different browsers are available, Microsoft Internet Explorer and Netscape Navigator are the two most popular.

We were particularly pleased also to note that Alorino Aires Evaristo Noreuga and João Novikoff Sales were also included in the list of recipients awarded Medals of Professional Merit. Both Alorino Noreuga and João Sales have been in the forefront helping with the travel logistics in connection with all the Macau Encontros and we are pleased that their untiring efforts and devotion to duty have been rewarded. This Association would like, belatedly, to take this opportunity to offer each and everyone of the recipients our warmest congratulations and best wishes.

#### VATICAN RELATIONS WITH CHINA

Macau

Portugal wants a Vatican representative to attend the ceremonies marking Macau's return to Chinese sovereignty later this year but Beijing is strongly resisting the idea, The Vatican's diplomatic relations with Taiwan remains the main stumbling block because the Vatican severed ties with China in the 1950s after communist officials wanted to appoint its own bishops and put mainland churches under an organisation which claimed to be the only official Catholic Church in China. It may well turn out that no representative of Pope John Paul II will turn up on the guest list for Macau's handover on 19-20 December 1999 Neither the Macau Government nor Macau's Catholic Diocese would comment, saying only that it was a diplomatic issue to be settled strictly between Beijing and Lisbon.

Hong Kong

Meanwhile China has also ruled out the question of Pope John Paul II visiting Hong Kong during his Asian tour later this year, citing again the Vatican's diplomatic ties with Taiwan. The Hong Kong Government is caught between its masters in Beijing and the emotions of over 250,000 Chinese Catholics in the former British colony. China's slamming the door on the Pope is also an example of China flexing its muscles on foreign and defence issues and defining the limits to the territory's autonomy since British rule ended in July 1997. Under the Sino-British accord, Hong Kong was granted a large degree of

autonomy for 50 years but control over foreign policy and defence issues would reside with Beijing. Beijing shied away from exercising its control on these two issues until recently when it banned U.S. warships and military aircraft from Hong Kong after NATO bombs hit the Chinese Embassy in Belgrade on May 7, 1999.

The decision that the Pope is not welcome sends a disastrous message around the world and the move by Beijing has been viewed in some circles as a profound symbolic loss of freedom for Hong Kong. #### POUSADA DE SÃO TIAGO (ROMANTIC and INTRIGUING)

Macau has retained the historic beauty of the Orient - a timeless quality searched by travellers from both near and far. The Fortealeza da Barra is one of the many fortresses built in the 17th Century by the Portuguese to defend themselves against other hostile European nations and local pirates. A chapel was built, one hundred years later, within its walls and dedicated to São Tiago (St. James), the patron saint of the Portuguese Army. Today, much of the fortress and the chapel has been preserved as part of the Pousada de São Tiago, a traditional Portuguese inn rising majestically from the walls of the fort. Ingenious in the artistry of its design, it offers a glimpse into the old Portuguese culture, the simple, solid beauty of the fortress complemented by the classical, refined style of the Pousada de São Tiago Inn.

With the closing of the Hotel Bela Vista at the end of March 1999, Pousada de São Tiago is the only fine hotel in Macau that boasts an elegant and historical ambience with first class amenities. There are only 20 rooms (14 with a balcony) and 4 suites, which means the tranquil atmosphere is always protected by the relatively small number of guests. For those who are looking for a quiet, relaxing getaway, the Pousada is the place.

#### MACAU EVENTS

August 20-22: Chinese Theatre Show Title "Run for your wife" at the Macau Cultural Centre.

This play is a hilarious comedy involving a Macau taxi driver who - due to the nature of his work and a convenient location - is able to manage two homes. He keeps both of his wives very happy without ever arousing any suspicion until a traffic accident lands him in hospital. As a result of the traffic accident, and in a confused state of mind, he provides the police with two home addresses and that's when the fun begins.

August 24: Feast of the Hungry Ghosts. Legend has it that unhappy souls are let out of hell during the seventh lunar month to roam the world. If they are not fed and satisfied, they can become vindictive. To appease them, they are offered food.

September 4-23: Art from Brazil: Paintings of Adelio Sarro Sobreinho will be displayed at the Macau Government Tourist Office, Largo do Senado.

September 10-11 Dance: Hong Kong's City Contemporary Dance Company will take place at the Macau Cultural Centre.

Sept. 11, 18, 25 and Oct 1 and 5: 11th International Fireworks Festival when international teams vie to put on the most spectacular fireworks display and spectacle of its kind. For five nights the teams from the Philippines, Australia, Taiwan, Germany, Thailand, the United Kingdom, China, Switzerland, Portugal and Japan will produce explosive wizardry as each country tries to outdo the other to gain the top prize.

September 24 Mid-Autumn or Moon Festival: Families go to open spaces to watch the moon, set up candles and lanterns and enjoy a picnic. Children particularly enjoy this festival.

Sept 27-30 and Oct 1-3: British Film Festival will be held at the Macau Cultural Centre whilst the 10th Macau Theatre Festival organised by Leal Senado will take place at the Forum.

October 1: A public holiday to celebrate the founding, in 1949, of the People's Republic of China

October 5: A public holiday to mark the establishment, in 1910, of the Portuguese Republic.

#### MACAU NEWSPAPER CLOSES DOWN

One of Macau's three Portuguese-language daily newspaper, "Futuro de Macau" folded at the end of July because of dwindling readership. In a farewell editorial, editor-in-chief, Severo Portela blamed the "reality of numbers" for the newspaper's demise which occurred 143 days before Macau is returned back to China.

Founded in 1993 by two local Portuguese lawyers, it had published 1,408 editions and was well known for its independent political stance and good contacts with judicial sources. Generally, Macau's Portuguese-language dailies are facing reduced circulation as the number of Portuguese expatriates drop, consequent to the localisation of many employment positions, especially in the Macau civil service.

## MACAU HANDOVER NEWS

### Air Show

Sky-diving and acrobatics will feature in a spectacular airshow to mark the handover of Macau to Chinese sovereignty on December 20, 1999. The event will be televised live to 180 countries and regions. It is being organised jointly by the Macau Handover Celebrations Committee and the Zhuhai International Aviation Club. A number of stunt flyers, including members of the Sky Box team from the Czech Republic and the Space Knights team from France will take part along with China's national parachute jumping team and the powered parachute team. Solo pilots from Russia, Hungary, Lithuania, Kazakhstan and the United States will be participating. Altogether 11 aircraft and about 200 persons will take part in the event which will open with a fly-past by Macau and Hong Kong flyers carrying the flags of China and the Macau Special Administrative Region.

### Handover Ceremony

Work is proceeding well on a 6,000 square-metre temporary structure to accommodate about 2,500 people who are expected to attend Macau's Handover ceremony on December 19, 1999.

Another temporary structure will be used for the Portuguese Cultural Event on the afternoon of December 19 and for an official banquet before the main ceremony. The designs for both structures are the work of architect Vicente Bravo. Before the official dinner, there will also be a reception for guests, with a cocktail party in the new gardens along the waterfront between the Kun Iam stature and the Macau Cultural Centre and a open air show will include fireworks.

### New Coins and Postage Stamps

As interest mounts each day on the historic change of administration on 19-20 December 1999, special coins and stamps are being issued. The Macau Monetary and Foreign Exchange Authority has launched the first of three sets of coins. The silver coin has a face value of 100 patacas and has a 24k gold oval inlay depicting the A-Ma Temple. Minted in Canada it will be sold in Macau and Hong Kong for 525 patacas. It features a Portuguese caravel on one side and a Chinese junk on the other. A second set of commemorative coins will be launched in October and in December 1999 gold coins will go on sale.

Social and cultural themes designed by Macau artist, Carlos Marreiros will be featured on a special issue of Macau postage stamps on December 19. Public interest in this philatelic "Macau Retrospective" is expected to be exceptionally high amongst stamp collectors, according to Macau's Postmaster-General, Roldão Lopes. Meanwhile China is preparing a special issue of stamps for launching on December 20, the first day under Chinese administration. Macau will continue to issue its own stamps after the handover on December 19-20, 1999.

## GOSTOS E SABORES

Galinha Chau Chau Parida (Sautéed shredded Chicken with turmeric powder)

(Source: Macau's Institute of Tourism Education)

### Ingredients

2.5 kilos Fillet of Chicken  
2 decilitros (dl) or cups Chinese white wine  
80 g ginger  
4-5 tsp turmeric powder  
400 g onion  
25 g garlic cloves  
3-4 tsp cornstarch  
salt and pepper to taste  
Spring onions, chopped as needed

### Directions

1. Cut chicken into strips and marinate with salt, pepper, Chinese white wine, shredded ginger and turmeric powder for about 20-30 minutes.
2. Sit fry onions until translucent; add garlic and chicken strips and stir fry for a little while more.
3. Add wine and a little water or stock and bring it to a boil. Thicken the sauce with cornstarch mixed with water.
4. Place on a suitable serving dish and sprinkle with chopped spring onions
5. Serves around ten persons. ENJOY

#### Píri Píri Sauce

A typical Portuguese piquant sauce, excellent with chicken, pork, or shellfish. Brush the sauce over the food before grilling them

##### Ingredients

4-6 small chillies  
 ½ pint (250 ml) olive oil  
 1 bayleaf  
 a small piece of lemon peel

##### Directions

1. Preheat oven to 225o F or 110o C
2. Take the top off each chile with a sharp knife, then put them in the olive oil in an oven-proof dish.
3. Add bayleaf and lemon rind and allow the mixture to infuse for several hours at the bottom of the oven.
4. Cool, seal and store for at least 24 hours before using the sauce.

#### Tomato Sauce

##### Ingredients

1 onion finely chopped  
 1 garlic clove  
 2 Tbsp olive oil  
 1 can tomatoes  
 salt and pepper to taste  
 1 bayleaf

##### Directions

1. Fry onions and garlic in a thick-bottomed saucepan. (Do not allow to brown).
2. Add the tomatoes, salt, pepper, and bayleaf.
3. simmer uncovered for about thirty minutes.
4. Blend in a liquidizer or press through a sieve.
5. Serve with chicken, beef or pasta.

#### Crab Cakes (Maryland style) (Chartwell at the Four Seasons)

##### Ingredients

1 lb (1/2 kg) crab meat  
 1/8 cup (30 ml) red peppers, finely diced  
 1/8 cup (30 ml) yellow peppers, finely diced  
 ¼ cup (60ml) red onions, finely diced  
 1/8 cup (30 ml) chives, minced  
 ½ cup (125 ml) Mayonnaise  
 1 tsp (5 ml) Dijon mustard  
 1 tsp (5 ml) Bouquet Garni  
 8 water or soda biscuits, broken into small pieces  
 3-4 eggs mixed with milk  
 2 tsp milk  
 3 cups (750 ml) coarse bread crumbs

##### Directions

1. Pick through the crab meat, ensuring there is no shell or cartilage
2. Sauté the peppers and onions in a pan until onions are translucent
3. Cool off and add to the crab

4. Add the Mayonnaise, mustard, spice and crackers and mix well.
5. Season to taste
6. Form into 4-oz cakes
7. Mix egg with milk and dip cakes into the egg mixture and then roll in the bread crumbs.
8. Fry until golden brown in 350o F oil (approximately 6 minutes)

#### Steamed Clams à la Portugese (Contributor: Graciete da Costa)

##### Ingredients

4 lbs butter clams (small to medium size)  
1 clove minced garlic  
2 Tbsp olive oil  
½ tsp sweet paprika  
"pinch" of pepper  
5 or 6 drops Tabasco  
Handful of parsley, coarsely chopped

##### Directions

1. Put olive oil in pan and fry minced garlic and chopped parsley for about 30 seconds.
2. Add clams and sprinkle paprika, pepper, and Tabasco over the clams.
3. Stir all the ingredients well whilst the clams are still closed.
4. Cover pan and check in 4-5 minutes and see if all clams open.
5. That's all folks. This is a mouth-watering seafood dish that serves about four persons.

#### Quails Cooked in the Portuguese Style (Serves four)

##### Ingredients

Oil for frying  
4 quails  
3 onions, chopped  
3 garlic cloves, chopped  
peppercorns  
cloves  
bayleaf  
thyme  
salt to taste  
¾ pint (375 ml) white wine  
3 Tbsp vinegar

##### Directions

1. Heat the oil in a frying pan and brown the quails quickly over a high heat.
2. When golden, remove to a casserole
3. Brown the chopped onions in the same oil, then add them with the oil to the quails.
4. Add the finely chopped garlic, cloves, peppercorns, bayleaf, thyme and salt.
5. Add the white wine and vinegar. The liquid should almost cover the birds.
6. Cover lightly and simmer until tender.
7. Arrange quails on a heated serving dish and keep warm. Reduce the cooking liquid by rapid boiling; thickening the liquid with a little cornstarch. Then spoon the gravy over the quails.

#### Truffle Squares

##### Ingredients

1 cup of evaporated milk  
½ cup sugar  
2 pkgs ( each 300 gr) semi-sweet chocolate chips  
¼ cup liqueur of your choice OR  
strong hot coffee (non-alcoholic version)

##### Icing Sugar

##### Directions

1. In a small saucepan combine evaporated milk and sugar.

2. Cook and stir over heat until mixture comes to a rolling boil.
3. Boil three minutes, stirring constantly.
4. Remove from heat and stir in chocolate chips and liqueur OR coffee
5. Stir well until mixture is well blended and smooth.
6. Spread in 9-inch (23 cm) square pan lined with foil.
7. Chill and cut into 64 squares
8. Toss squares in icing sugar and serve. (deliciously decadent !!)
